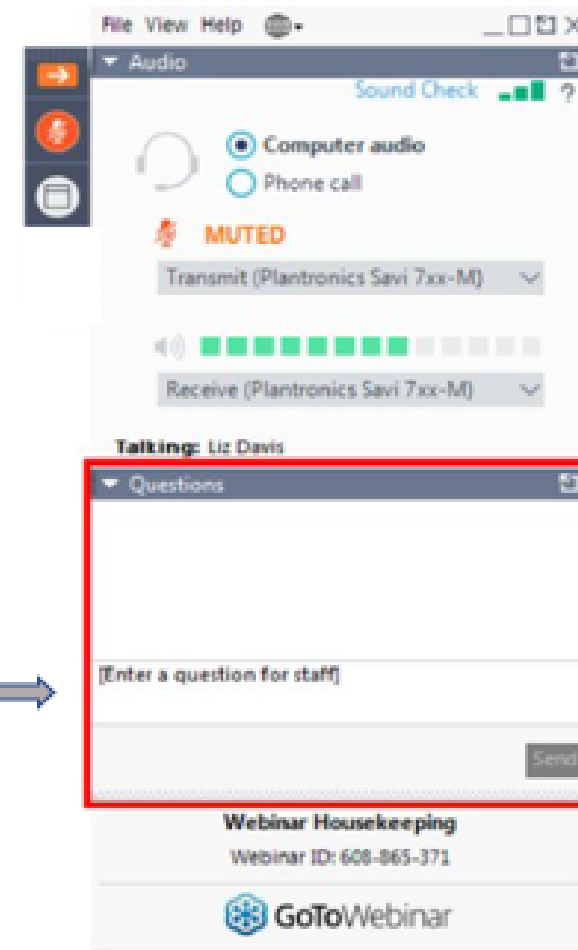

Background and Your Perspective



Background

PCORI is partnering with the **Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ)** to develop a systematic evidence review on Postpartum Care for Women up to One Year After Birth, a topic nominated by the **American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG)**.

Goals

Support the possible development of an evidence-based guideline

Summarize existing research to support parents and clinicians in treatment decisions

Identify key areas for future clinical studies

What is a systematic review?

- A systematic review is a way to summarize what existing research says about a given topic.
- They are conducted using rigorous methods.
- The results can have many potential uses:
 - Informing clinical guidelines
 - Helping patients and clinicians with treatment decisions
 - Identifying areas for future research
 - Support policy initiatives

A systematic review is a powerful tool. We want it to be as useful as possible to patients, caregivers, clinicians, and decision makers.

We need your personal and professional expertise to do this.

Proposed Systematic Review Questions



Key Questions

1. What strategies for healthcare delivery **increase appropriate postpartum healthcare utilization within one year of birth?**
2. What strategies for health care delivery **improve maternal (and infant) health outcomes within one year of birth?**
3. Does expansion of healthcare or better healthcare coverage result in increased healthcare utilization or better maternal health outcomes?

Population: Postpartum women.

How do the findings vary by women with high and low risk of postpartum complications, by specific complications or disorders of pregnancy (such as hypertensive and cardiovascular disorders of pregnancy, gestational diabetes, etc.) and subgroups defined by patient and hospital characteristics (i.e., by race, socioeconomic status, type of coverage, hospital patient population and volume, and in rural areas, etc.).

Interventions: Timing of postpartum visit, how/when/where care is delivered, who provides care, how care is managed and coordinated, interventions that target healthcare providers, health education interventions, comprehensive healthcare insurance coverage

Outcomes: Maternal health outcomes (e.g. Hospital readmission related to maternal cause, postpartum visit attendance, adherence to screening or lab testing, etc.); harms, and infant outcomes in some questions

Timing: Up to one year

However, as different women have different experiences with childbirth, postpartum and maternity care, this review aims to further analyze findings, whenever possible, by subgroup (e.g. high or low risk of postpartum complications, race, socioeconomic status, type of healthcare coverage, etc.).
 - Do you have recommendations for additional analytic subgroups?
- How do inequities and disparities play into the postpartum period and experience?

- As a patient or family member, what do you consider are the essential elements of good medical follow-up care during the year after giving birth? What approaches or factors do you think are most helpful in facilitating appropriate postpartum follow up care?
- As a healthcare provider, how do you determine the appropriate follow up for your postpartum patient? What is most helpful in encouraging patient attendance at postpartum follow up appointments?

Outcomes

Which maternal health outcomes are most important to you – please identify your perspective as a patient, caregiver, or provider?

Contextual Question

What additional evidence is needed (e.g., research gaps) to assess the value of extending postpartum care to one year after pregnancy?
